I always think that one of the best qualities we can imbue in our children (apart from 'do unto others as you would have them do unto you') is to be curious. Curious about the world – 'why is it so? As writers we are curious about people, their histories, their motivation and we want to put their stories down in an engaging manner. We write, usually, to have others read our writings. But as writers we need to read. Stephen King has said, "If you haven't got time to read you haven't got time to write."

"Reading—the good and the bad—inspires you. It develops your palate for all the tricks that writers have invented over the years. You can learn from textbooks about the writing craft, but there's no substitute for discovering for yourself how a writer pulls off a trick. Then that becomes part of your experience." Writer Roz Morris.

So here is a call for all of us to read more! As writers we appreciate the written word, we love the sounds of words but do we read enough words of other people. We need to read the newspaper (print or online) for what is going on in the world and books, and more books. Often we are not sure what to choose. Use your library — ask a librarian. Read the weekend newspapers, for example, the

Sydney Morning Herald weekend *Spectrum* section which has book reviews. Keep up to date with the latest winners of the literary competitions. Look at the library's lists of books you might like if you prefer a particular author or genre (sheets on the end of each row of shelves). Join a book club. The Library has sponsored book clubs with book club books borrowed from the library each month which are in multiple copies and have folders of questions for the book club leader. Set up a book exchange with a couple of friends and lend books. Buy a Kindle and add books to your collection for a fraction of the price of a new book or scour the second hand book shops. No excuse! *Leonie*

The sound of frantic motors came from every direction. He ran swerving, avoiding the violent wind from the hovering machine. His hooves churned the dirt, his blood pounded through his veins. Speed should carry him clear of pursuit, but his nostrils burned with the scent of acrid fumes.

Desperate, he scrambled down the cliff path toward the dunes. Behind him three motors raged, each moment brought the angry screams closer.

The dunes offered little protection. The soft sand mocked his efforts, grasping, gripping, giving way when he needed firm ground. He struggled upward, through the pig-face and coarse grass, into the open and toward the expanse of calm blue ocean.

He reared. Screamed at the machine, but it took no notice. Behind the stallion the machines carrying men closed in. They blocked the path to the dunes and the beach.

The stallion turned and lunged into the waves. Avoiding capture now his only goal.

Cold water welcomed him. Sand sucked at his hooves, reluctant to release him as he plunged deeper into the sea. The white crests beckoned. 31 May: AHWA Competition

The Australian Horror Writers Association wants your best horror story. All themes in horror will be accepted, from the supernatural classics (zombies, vampires, ghosts), to psychological roller-coaster rides, to the highly original.

1 June: The Richelle Prize for Emerging Writers

Now in its second year, The Richelle Prize was established by Hachette Australia to encourage emerging writers in Australia. Entries are open to unpublished writers of adult fiction and adult narrative non-fiction. The winner receives \$10,000 in prize money and a 12-month mentorship with one of Hachette's publishers.

3 June: Shoalhaven Literary Award 2016 for Poetry

Accepting poems of 60 lines maximum, with an open theme. First prize winner receives \$1000 and a two week residency in Nowra, other cash prizes also awarded.

6 June: ACU Prize for Poetry

The Australian Catholic University is once again holding its annual national Prize for Poetry. The theme for this year's prize is 'Loving Kindness'.
